#### **BEWARE OF THE BEES!!**

It's that time of year again and I don't mean Christmas! Judie Uchitel and I were having a wonderful ride a couple days ago with Judie on her new horse, Tokyo, and me on Peeka-boo. We stopped for lunch by a little creek, tied our horses, and proceeded to walk through the grass to an attractive spot by an old "bent tree" when all of a sudden Judie was yelling BEES and I ran back to untie the horses and move them further away. In the meantime, the bees were chasing us and of course, doing what they do-STING. Unfortunately, I was stung 5 times and Judie got hit, I don't know how many times. She said she was allergic and I said "me too". Fortunately I had some Benedryl with me which we took right away. We managed to ride up to Windswept Farm, calling DJ along the way. DJ took Judie home and then her husband took her to emergency. Jamie & Terri Troup came to the rescue so Jamie could ride Tokyo home with me to Pendley Stables and I proceeded to trailer home.

Fortunately, there was a happy ending to this story. Judie and I had large welts with lots of swelling and itching but with lots of Benedryl and other meds we survived. The horses each had a couple stings but not too bad. There is a moral to this story. Be prepared!

- Move out of range of fire immediately. If there is a group riding together, yell BEES immediately and riders in front trot out quickly and those behind, make a 180 and trot away from the bees. Do not canter as that excites the horses too much.
- Take Benedryl on every ride starting this time of year and until the first freeze. Take an EpiPen if you are really allergic.

## BEWARE OF THE BEES!! (Cont.)

- Yellow jackets will follow you so ride out until you don't experience them anymore. Be sure to wash the stings with alcohol pads or water if you don't have any. When the bees sting, they leave an odor which will attract other bees as you ride down the trail.
- If you experience difficulty breathing or start to get a rash around your body's hot spots, get emergency help.

I hope this is a helpful reminder of how to deal with bees when riding.

#### **HORSE RIDING OPTIONS**

The Garland Mountain Horse and Hiking Trails is a Cherokee County green space park that offers quality trails for equestrian and hiking activities. The original park space was 540 acres of forested hilly terrain. In 2014 an additional 400 acres were added to the park. Currently 19.7 miles of trail are open for horseback riding and hiking, and we expect to have about 26 miles of loop trails when development is finished.



Volunteer Friends of Garland Mountain Trails (FGMT) design, develop, and maintain these trails, working in close cooperation with the Cherokee Recreation and Parks Agency. The trailhead provides gravel parking for 20-40 horse trailer rigs (20 normal, up to 40 if directed parking). Toilet, covered pavilion, kiosk and trail signage amenities are provided. Users are encouraged to post trail conditions and share your experience on these trails.

Another option is Fausett Farms, located along Highway 183 in the heart of Dawson County. The trails travel over 30 miles through the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains on 8 different trails. The property is privately owned and operated by the Fausett family. Sections of this property have been in the Fausett family since 1858. There is a small fee to ride or you can purchase a yearly pass.

We are very lucky to have great riding locations like Garland Mountain and Fausett Farms.

#### **Fly Control**

As much as a horse loves to have his face scratched to get at the itchy spots that can't be reached, he hates to be bothered by the tickle of insects buzzing about his head and crawling on his face. Luckily, there are some practical and pre-

ventive remedies. In this article we'll talk about some tactics that you can use to keep flies and mosquitoes at bay.

Chemical and Pharmacological Means of Fly and Mosquito Control

Attempts at insect control include insecticide repellents applied over a horse's body or in stabling areas. Insects might continue to bother a horse because of their attraction to movement, body warmth or carbon dioxide exhalations. But, repellents help keep down the attacks by noxious biting flies and mosquitoes. Insects are repelled by these products, but not necessarily killed.



Insect repellents applied around the face help keep flies away from the eyes and thin skin of the face. Avoid using sprays on the head as chemicals could accidentally get into a horse's eyes and cause chemical burns. Roll-on insect repellents are safer to use as long as they don't come in contact with the eyes. Spot-on insecticides with permethrin applied to the poll, tail, and behind each hock and knee seem to protect for a couple of weeks.

Daily feed-through insecticides pass through the horse's GI tract and out with the feces to kill developing fly maggots on the ground. They only work in the manure and not in other insect breeding areas. In addition, if feed-through insecticides are used, the kill-off of larvae leaves the parasitoid wasps with little to feed on.

Fly traps—strips and containers with bait—are useful to kill houseflies, but they won't necessarily attract biting stable flies. Ultraviolet bug zappers are fairly effective at killing mosquitoes and some fly species (stable and houseflies), but be careful not to place them close to combustible materials like hay or straw.

Misting or fog sprayers in the barn using pyrethrin chemicals help to drop the number of biting stable flies and mosquitoes pretty quickly. It is also possible to apply residual insecticides to barn walls, ceilings and rafters. Try to use different chemicals throughout the insect season to minimize development of resistance by house flies, horn flies and stable flies.

#### The Bottom Line

There is not a sole insect control strategy that cures all the pest problems on a horse property. It will take a compilation of strategies to keep your horses bothered as little as possible during insect season. Environmental management is essential to reduce insect population numbers.





