



A Canter Down Memory Lane


Recollections by Margaret Lonsdale-Part 2

One reoccurring memory that makes me giggle every time I drive up Soquili Trail was the racing rivalry between Sandra and Leigh's horses; Sandra's horse, Smokey, a buckskin with beautiful eyes, cut late in life so he still was a stallion in his mind.



Leigh's horse, Sassy, equally beautiful, a quarter palomino mare with attitude for days. Each horse loved a race and their owners obliged them often. Back in the day, Hickory Cove subdivision was not paved. We raced around those roads like it was a private race track. If we met a car,

it was a moment of terror followed by an exclamation of "Whew, what a ride." Toward the end of the Hickory Cove circle, there was a portion of the road that had an uphill grade. At the top was the path back to the barn, now known Soquili as Trail. Needless to say, it was a primo place to "air 'em out" like that wacky stable master—post The Dillinghams—used to say. Sandra and Leigh would inevitably find their way to the front of the group in anticipation of this portion of the road. Usually Smokey would take off because Sandra is a hellion on horseback and loves not only the "Racking High" but also the "Running High." Smokey loved taking the lead. He was quite deft at cutting



the approaching horse off. Leigh would follow on Sassy at speeds unknown, yelling "Sassy, quit!"

The specific race that makes me laugh out loud is when the two horses were approaching the turn to the right up Soquili Trail. Smokey cut off Sassy near the turn in true competitive fashion and was on his way to victory. With nowhere to go, the spunky mare with her unknowing passenger, went off road and cut the corner through the woods and over a fallen tree, all gallop, to abreast of Smokey as they ran up the hill. It is still a wonder that we didn't suffer cerebral injury or at least put an eye out with all the high-rise dancing in the dark. It was during these times I got to know folks, laughing and sharing stories.

So are the ramblings of a 47-year-old BTSC member. I have celebrated my birthdays, congo'ed through the millennium, and enjoyed just about everything with many of you. You were present when I paraded my new steeds in front of the group. You were there, even on a weekday, to support me as I put down my first horse, Parker. Now, even though I spend less time with the



club, I feel a sense of coming home as I drive into Jasper and turn onto Burnt Mountain Road. There's Bobby on his motorcycle. There's Kathy trailering off new adventure. а to There's Randy's red truck. There's BJ's sign that says she can hypnotize people. I have and will continue to share my life with these folks. Mr. Ed was a talking palomino in a 1960s TV show by the same name. At a time when Westerns dominated, Mr. Ed was the anti-Western. The main human character a klutzy architect named, Wilbur, and the hero a horse that was fond of his meals and comfortable life. Allan "Rocky" Lane, who made dozens of B-Westerns, voiced him. The show was a five-year hit. Mr. Ed offered a gentle, homely wisdom that enabled him to straighten out the troubles of the humans around him. To make Mr. Ed "talk," initially, his trainer put nylon thread in his mouth. Ed actually learned to move his lips on cue when the trainer touched his hoof. In fact, he soon learned to do it when Wilbur stopped talking during a scene. Mr. Ed's real name was Bamboo Harvester. He was an American Saddlebred-Arabian and lived from 1949-1970. His horse double on the show was a second palomino named Pumpkin.

Recipe Roundup

Peppermint Thumbprints

Makes 15 Horse Treats

Ingredients

3 cups rolled oats (e.g., Nutrena Country Feeds Premium Horse Oats)

3/4 cup water

5 Tbs molasses

15 peppermints or spearmints

Instructions

- 1. In a large bowl, mix the oats and water until the oats are damp.
- Add molasses one tablespoon at a time, until the oats are all covered and are sticky*.
- 3. Roll into balls, the size of a golf ball.
- 4. Take 1 peppermint and press it down into the middle of the cookie.
- 5. Repeat until all of the mixture has been used.
- 6. Refrigerate (uncovered) for 4-6 hours, or freeze for 2-3 hours to harden.

*You can add another tablespoon or two of molasses, add as much as you need.

Lost Skills of the Pony Express

The Pony Express is one of the most enduring stories of the Old West

A Brief Chapter

By the mid-1800s, the population of California had exploded. Residents were eager to correspond with connections back east, but communication required incredible patience; mail delivery took a month by boat or overland stage. By the late 1850s, a trio of enterprising freighting firm owners supported the idea of an express overland mail route delivered by horseback relay: the Pony Express. On April 3, 1860, the first rider left St. Joseph, Missouri. Ten days and 1,900 miles later, the mail reached its final destination, San Francisco. Eventually, the Pony Express required more than 150 stations, 120 riders, and 400 horses. Despite the dangers of the trail, there are only two accounts of lost mail. Just 19 months after its start, the Pony Express discontinued after the Overland Telegraph Company completed its construction of the telegraph line.



Orphans Preferred

Allegedly, the ad placed for Pony Express riders read, "Wanted: Young, Skinny, Wiry Fellows not over 18. Must be expert riders willing to risk death daily. Orphans preferred."

Hard-earned

Pony Express riders were hired at \$50 per month, plus room and board. Over time, this rose to \$100 to \$125. A few whose rides were particularly danger-

ous or who braved unusual dangers received \$150.

Horse-Powered

The Pony Express was set up to provide a fresh horse every 10–15 miles. Seventy -five horses were needed to make a one-way trip. Along the eastern end of the trail, Thoroughbreds and Morgans were typical mounts; toward the western end, mustangs were the preferred choice.

The Mochila

The rapid exchange of mail from one rider to another would not have been possible without the mochila. The mochila—simply a leather covering thrown over the saddle, with pouches for the mail—allowed mail to go from


one saddle to the other without needing to change the saddle. When a rider arrived at a relay station, a fresh horse, saddled and bridled, was waiting for him. The rider changed the mochila from one saddle to another and was off.
