Meet Maverick the Mustang



My horse, Deuce, was diagnosed with arthritis in his hocks and kissing spine. While he has been treated with lots of stuff and I've been working on developing his thoracic sling, he is still quite unhappy. This journey made me realize that it was time

to take the pressure off me and Deuce. I needed to let go of trying to get him back to being my riding horse and work on making him comfortable in the pasture. That decision felt like a weight off my shoulders, and I was excited to embark on the

journey to find a new horse. Mustangs have caught my attention over that past few years. So the search began. The friends that helped out in immeasurable ways are truly the best, and I couldn't have done it without them. Timing was perfect and I found a gem in less than two weeks. Here's the story.

Once I made the decision, Lisa Sylvia went with me to try out a horse in North Georgia. That one wasn't right for me. I made a call to a friend in North Carolina who not only had bought two mustangs, but had watched a lot of the Mustang competitions and also had relationships with many trainers. I told her on a Tuesday that I was looking. She immediately said I needed to go the Mustang Classic at the Kentucky Horse Park where there would be lots of horses available. I would certainly be able to find one. She was heading

there the next day, Wednesday. So, while I couldn't get there that soon, she was on the hunt, and we were texting constantly about possible horses. She'd get the low down on them as to availability, pricing, conformation, disposition, etc. She was all-in on a little mare that was amazing... and I had to come see her.

She had already told the trainer that I was coming and arranged transportation for the horse back to Jasper for me. When I said to her, "That's hilarious," she answered, "No, I'm dangerous." Funny! Now I *had* to get there and really wanted company to ride with me.

It was a last minute decision to go for the weekend, and Claire Eubanks said she was able to leave Saturday morning. That was great until I found out that I had to be there first thing that same morning. However, as always, Claire

was game! So we left late Friday night at 8:00 PM, arrived in Lexington by 1:30 AM and were at the barn bright and early by 8:30 AM.



It was a whirlwind after that! We worked helping out trainers in the barn, the warm up areas, prepping props for the freestyle event and then actually moving them in and out of the arena during the freestyle event. It was absolutely amazing! The work that goes into these events is overwhelming.

The care that all these trainers have about making a great match between a Mustang and its new owner is so honest and sincere. Somewhere in this organized chaos, I got to ride two mustangs. The little mare that I thought was going to be the one didn't work out for me. We just didn't click.

And then there was Maverick. He wasn't even on the list or talked about until I got there, but my friend said that he had really grown on her over the week and I should check him out. It was pretty much love at first sight, and I bought him. I was able to talk with the trainer and her ownership partner. Everyone was happy about the match.

The prearranged transport was by another trainer who was heading home to Florida. She left at 3:00 AM and dropped Maverick at the Sylvia's farm

about 8:30 that morning. I was still in Lexington and barely out of bed. Once I got home, Lisa trailered him to my place since my truck was in the shop. It takes a village, and I have an amazing one... I'm so lucky!

Meet Maverick: 5-year-old gelding from the Salt Wells Creek HMA in Wyoming. He was gathered on Nov. 15, 2021 and pulled from holding in Nebraska in November 2024. The

trainer, Camille White, has had him since then. She competed with him in Las Vegas at the Mustang Challenge in July with only about 30 rides on him and then brought him to Lexington for the Mustang Classic. The boy's got a few travel miles on him. In my opinion, he has the absolute cutest face! He's sorrel with a flaxen mane and tail. While he's still green and cautious, he is curious, confident and self

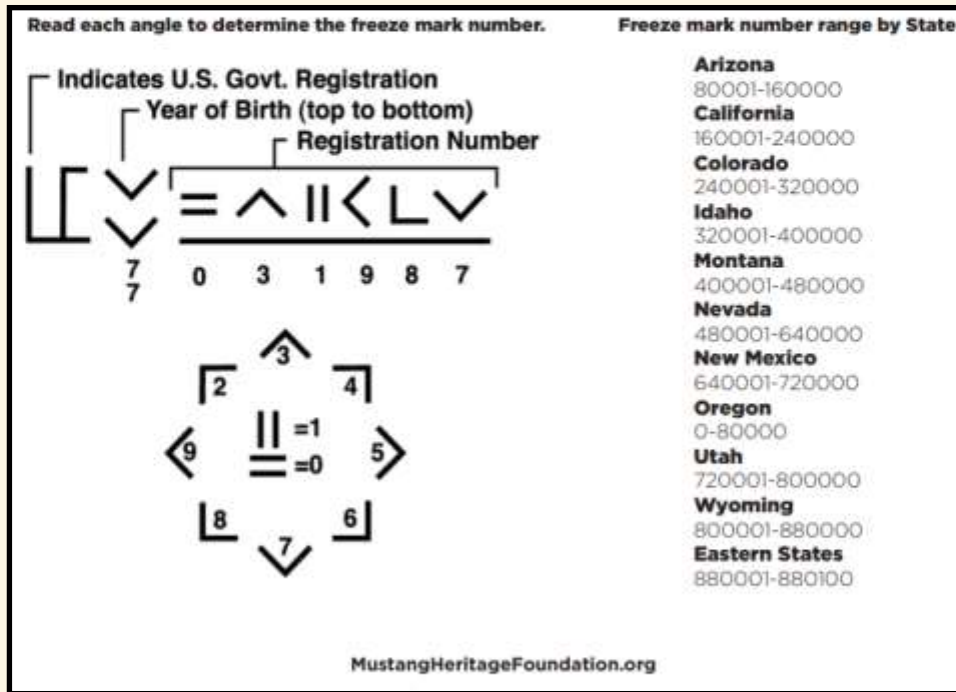

Wild Mustang and Burro Freeze Marks



made to apply freeze marks that are legible, occasionally freeze marks do get blurred. This happens when the animal moves as the iron is applied, resulting in all or some of the identification number becoming illegible. The graph on the left illustrates how to read a freeze mark.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) uses freeze marking to identify captured wild horses and burros. Freeze marking is a permanent, unalterable, and painless way to identify each horse and burro as an individual. It is applied on the left side of the neck. It follows the International Alpha Angle System, which uses a series of angles and alpha symbols that cannot be altered. The mark contains the Registering Organization (U.S. Government), year of birth, and registration number.

The technique is simple

and completely painless to the animal. The left side of the neck is shaved and washed with alcohol, and the mark is applied with an iron that is chilled in liquid nitrogen. The hair at the site of the mark will grow back white and show the identification number.

In addition to the freeze mark on the left side of the neck, sanctuary wild horses are marked on the left croup with four-inch high Arabic numerals that correspond with the last four digits of the freeze mark on the neck.

Our Trip To Iceland

Iceland was on my bucket list and I was recently blessed to fulfill that dream. The bonus - I also got to see and trail ride an Icelandic horse.

One of the five original breeds of horses, these beautiful animals are spread throughout the Icelandic countryside. Although they only range from 12.1 to 14.1 hands high, they are listed as horses (not ponies) in the international registry because of their physical ca-

pabilities. Their uniqueness doesn't stop there though.

They are a five-gaited horse whose "gait" is called a tolt. Most are genetically programmed to walk, trot, tolt, canter/gallop, and pace.

Crossbreeding is not permitted and only small numbers are exported annually. There is no importation of horses to Iceland as they do not want to chance watering down the blood lines or bring in disease. These stout, easy keepers do

not require vaccinations at home in Iceland.

My horse, Reykur (meaning "smoke" in Icelandic), was quiet, well-mannered and easy-going on our two-hour trek through the Icelandic countryside. For someone who usually rides a three-gaited horse, the tolt gait was amazing.

There are small pockets of Icelandic horses in the US. God willing, I will be blessed to own one of these wonderful creatures.

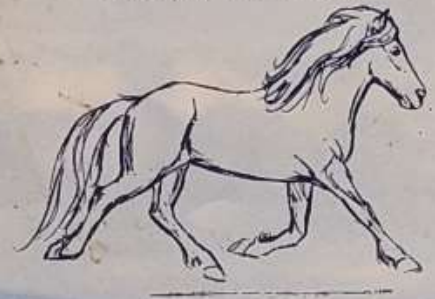

The Horses of Iceland

Characteristics of Icelandic Horses



The beautiful island of Iceland has sand fields, mountains, glaciers, and rivers. It's also home to the Icelandic horse. This breed is known for being hardy and sure-footed. They handle the rough terrain of their home country with ease! Icelandic horses have made their way to various parts of the world. They're rare, but growing in popularity.

Characteristics of Icelandic Horses

- Stand from 13 and 14 hands on average.
- Weigh around 730 to 840 pounds.
- Come in a range of colors from chestnut and black to palomino and bay.
- Have a double coat in the winter.
- Grow thick manes and tails with coarse hair.

- Have strong and stout legs.
- Considered a five-gaited breed, consisting of a walk, trot, canter/gallop, tölt, and skeið (flying pace).

In addition to these physical attributes, the horses of Iceland are known for being friendly, curious, and easy going. They're very patient and forgiving with beginner riders. On the other hand, they're competitive and easy to train for more advanced students.

Recipe Roundup

Pumpkin Spice Dump Cake

Serves 8 Wranglers



Ingredients

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 15 oz. cans pumpkin puree
- 1 16 oz. can evaporated milk
- 3 Tsp pumpkin pie spices
- ½ Tsp salt
- 1 box spice cake mix
- ¾ cup butter, melted

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 F degrees.
2. Combine pumpkin, sugar, evaporated milk, eggs, pumpkin pie spices, and salt in a mixing bowl. Beat well.
3. Pour into greased and floured 9 x 13-inch glass pan. Sprinkle cake mix over pumpkin. Pour melted butter over all – DO NOT MIX.
4. Bake for 50 to 60 minutes until knife inserted in center comes out clean.
5. Let it cool for 30 minutes or so before slicing.

Variations

- Swap the pumpkin puree for pumpkin pie filling for a sweeter cake.
- Mix in walnut or candied chopped pecans for crunch. Dried cranberries are also yummy!
- Add some orange zest or ginger for a bit of brightness.
